On registering one's boat, a unique hull or sail number is issued which enables the yacht to compete in official racing events in Canada and in other Countries.

President's Report

In this, the Western side of the country, we are between Spring and Fall events. Having completed a regional and national regattas which were both well attended we now look forward to the IOM Prairie regional in Calgary and a Western DF Regional in Vancouver. Also continuing are events in our Coastal Cup Traveller's series. There is a lot to commend in the holding of a Traveller's series of a formal nature quite apart from getting to know other skippers in a class and it helps in promoting a high standard of sailing.

Memberships

Both renewals and new members continue to drift in. Some renewals are from members who were last members in 2011 and 2012. The membership at present stands at 200 members. However, there are approximately forty ex members from 2015 who have yet to renew. It would seem that membership has skipped in their minds as quite a few of this happy band still email me regarding CRYA matters.

Personal Sail Numbers.

Members who have been issued with personal sail number should take a second look at the conditions posted on our web site. A personal sail number is "leased" to a skipper for a period of five years for an annual payment of \$5 at membership renewal time (30th November). Non payment of the annual \$5 means that your right to the PSN ceases. This has two resulting possibilities - any one can apply for the number and the other requires that you remove the number from any sails it may be on. Those with guilty consciences may send a cheque! There are three exceptions to the above and all are Victoria owners who were issued a PSN to allow me to re-register their boat.

Membership Renewal



In most organizations membership renewal is due at the end of the organizations financial year. In the frozen areas of our country there is perhaps no great incentive to think about sailing other than wistfully but it would make life a little simpler for the treasurer and registrar to get it over with rather dribbling on through the following twelve months. It also avoids the small embarrassment of entering for a sanctioned regatta to find your entry rejected

Boat Registration

Once a member registers a boat for a Hull Registration Number which stays with the hull / boat the boat does not require re-registration while in the original registrant's ownership. With the international classes the registration payment also includes the issuing of a measurement certificate when the boat completes measurement. On transfer to a new owner the boat has to be re-registered and in the case of the international classes re-certificated. The registrar has slightly more work in a re- registration.

Administration.

Victoria Class, Robert Langlois has volunteered to act as Class Secretary. Robert has been given the most recent list of active class members. The class has no National or Regional Championship scheduled for 2016 and very few members in the West or Prairie Regions. Considerable effort by class members is required.

Ontario Region Director.

Ontario is our largest region numerically and has been without a Regional director for quite some time. This is unfortunate as the region has three classes which have little activity outside of Ontario. The region needs an active director to co-ordinate and encourage activity with in the region.

New AMYA Class - DragonFlite 95

Since I last wrote about this topic the activity in this class has taken off worldwide, Great Britian, Germany, France, Netherlands and Australia. There is even a fleet of 26 DF 95s in <u>Japan</u>.

There is a newly formed US DF95 COA here: http://dragonflite95.us/ with over 130 owners.

Since being introduced in March this year, there is already a US NCR being held in Texas in October. There are over 40 sailors already registered, some from GBR and Australia, as well as some top sailors from the IOM class attending.

This shows how popular this class has become in just 8 months. It is a good fit for DF65 sailors wanting to upgrade, but not ready for the expense and complexity of an IOM.

If you have purchased a DragonFlite 95 and



reside in Canada, then you can register the boat using the form on the <u>CRYA Register a boat page</u> using the 'others' category. Once we achieve 20 boats registered it will become an officially recognized class



in Canada (I have registered mine as hull No. 1).

IOM Class Secretary Report

The 2016 Canadian National Championship is a wrap for another year, a complete report can be found in this newsletter. There are two more major events on the Canadian schedule for this year; the Eastern Regional to be held in Kingston on September 10th-11th, and the Prairie Regional scheduled for September 24th-25th in Calgary. Both regattas are ranking events for Canada; the Kingston Regatta is also a US ranking event.

Also coming up is the fourth race of the Coastal Cup; the One Day Moo regatta will take place at Cowichan Lake on August 20th with the fifth and final race day scheduled for the Royal Victoria Yacht Club on October 16th.

The European Championships took place in June at the Club Nautico De Vitoria in Spain. The series went down to the last race with Brad Gibson finishing one point ahead of Rob Walsh, with third place going to Alexis Carre of France. Unfortunately, the organizers website was not updated very often, thus real time news had to be gleaned from social media. Many sailors expressed frustration with the absolute forest of weeds they encountered, apparently it's not

an uncommon occurrence at the venue. Weed nets were not on hand, and therefore had to be built as the regatta progressed. Unfortunately, a lot of skippers were out of the running by then, very frustrating given the travel, time, and costs involved to participate.

The IOM World Championship will take place in Pierrelatte, France from May 13th to 20th, 2017. Canada will probably only be allotted one berth; the Canadian representative will be determined by the total ranking points as tallied for the past two years, after the AMYA R7 regatta, and the US Nationals have been completed. Should no one express interest, Canada's spot will be awarded to another country.

The number of skippers sending in registrations for new IOM's this year has been impressive. However, please remember the issuing of a hull registration number is not the same as having a measurement certificate. Your boat may look, feel, smell, and sail, like an IOM, but without a current certificate, it's just another RC sailboat, albeit, a really nice one. So, if you want to participate in a CRYA or AMYA sanctioned event, it must be certificated.

IOM Canadian Nationals Regatta Report

For the second year in a row, the Nationals were held on Saltspring Island, the largest of the Gulf Islands that make for some of the best sailing and cruising destinations in Canada.

Thirty-five skippers descended upon the Saltspring Island Sailing Club June 2nd-5th in anticipation of not only intense competition and renewed rivalries on the water, but also relaxed evenings socializing at the various events planned by the organizers.

Canada was well represented with twenty skippers, most hailing from BC, but also including three from Alberta and one from Ontario. US skippers filled out the ranks, with eleven coming from Washington State and four travelling from California.

The array of boats was impressive with nineteen different designs registered. There were six beautiful 'woodies' that performed very well, most noticeably Puff, designed and crafted by Graham Herbert, and Calypso, also designed by Graham, which was built and sailed by brother Martin, who finished a very strong 9th. David's, Cook and Jensen,

and Rob Mulder, managed to get their new wooden builds on the start line with only a few technical glitches, I think they were all pleased with the results and their potential. Steve Kibble was sailing a Goth XP woody that also showed good speed. Ian Vicker's V9 and V8 designs had a strong presence capturing 5 of the top ten places, and Gary Boell's new Byerley designed and built Nitro was quick all weekend long. Seven different designs finishing in the top ten makes for a successful box rule.

Thursday was the official measuring and unofficial practice day. Once measured in, many skippers opted to head down to the dock to get an idea as to how to sail the venue and get their boats up to speed. Others checked into hotels, B&B's, or set up camp in the club's upper parking lot. There was time to explore Ganges before most made their way to Martin and Rosemary Herbert's home for a wonderful pre-regatta dinner and get together.

Friday morning was overcast with the usual southerly inflow breeze developing. The fleet was

split into two fleets for the seeding races as the wind held in mid #1 range. In all, seven races were completed (fourteen heats) with a lot of very close racing as was expected given the calibre of the fleet. I think every start was recalled with two starts being blackflagged; the RC certainly had their work cut out for them. George Pedrick, Gary Boell, and Graham Herbert were the top three skippers after day one.

Saturday saw winds switch to the north for most of the day; again, #1 conditions prevailed throughout the day. Temperatures reached upwards of 30C, causing the wind to fluctuate between the predominant northwesterly breeze in the gulf and the southerly inflow wind, putting the RC's course management skill's to the test. Apart from shifty winds, seaweed can also be a problem on the course, and Martin's nets were at the ready, but fortunately, the weed never became a major issue, so the nets

weren't deployed. With another eight races completed, the leaderboard was becoming a bit more clear, the top three remained the same with quite a battle shaping up for fourth through eighth place, not to mention throughout the entire scoreboard where there were several close duels taking place. And, to the relief of the RC, skippers finally sorted out their starting techniques as the number of recalls on the day dropped to one or two.

Saturday night was Roger Kibble's turn to shine as he prepared his special salmon recipe on the BBQ for the dinner held in the clubhouse.

Sunday dawned sunny and very warm, with light #1 conditions. Three races were completed before the race committee decided that the winds were most likely done for the day. This gave everyone time to get packed up before the awards were to be handed out, and then head for the ferry and home.

Many of the final positions were in doubt until the last race. Previous National's Champion George Pedrick (V9) sailed a brilliant regatta and led from

Lastly, a huge thank-you to all the participants that made the effort from near and afar to attend the event. The intense competition and the camaraderie shown both on the water and away from it, are the elements that make this sport so special. Without your support, the Regatta wouldn't have been the success it was.

US1M National Regatta Report

WMYC hosts the CRYA US1M National Championship Regatta June 12/16

This event was a challenge to bring together as a NCR had not been sailed for this class since 2004. Over the years this once very active class has taken a back seat to other classes notably I.O.M.'s and Solings. Few active fleets remain in Canada and attracting participants proved to be difficult. So while the fleet may have been small in number the quality of the sailors more than made up for it.

Nine registrations were received but before we hit the water, work and family obligations had reduced this number by two.

The Vollmer Pond, where the event was sailed, is fully exposed with no trees, buildings or other obstacles to block the wind. It is an ideal location and we receive the full force of the wind at all times. Windsor Model Yacht Club Vice Commodore Bernie Pepin has made a detailed study of these waters and can set a perfect course for any wind direction.

Another great feature of this venue is the launching dock negotiated through the tireless efforts of WMYC Commodore Terry Desjardins with the Town of LaSalle and regional marine contractor, Dean Construction who donated a small construction barge for our use.

When racing began at 9:30 AM Sunday, we had sunny skies and beautiful temperatures. Winds were brisk at 15 - 18 mph from the north. In these winds boat speed is very fast and maintaining control required very close attention.

The first six races of the morning session were sailed without major incident with four different winners and close competition throughout the fleet.

Winds remained up and the direction began to clock to the west. Disaster struck in the seventh and final race of the morning session with a near sinking after a collision and two DNF's.

Damage through the morning session proved fatal to two boats and the already small fleet was further reduced.

A new course was set during the lunch break to match the changed wind direction.

This course was a challenge in the first race of the afternoon session as the very strong winds brought the boats a little close to the shore with the consequence that three boats grounded briefly. They all were able to get off and continued the race. Subsequent races saw the sailors treat the near shore with a great deal more respect.

The strong winds continued unabated with onboard water and boat damage playing an unwelcome part so that at the end only four boats remained in the race.

It was a day of perseverance with only two competitors completing all fourteen races. Also notable was that six of the seven entrants won at least one race which is a tribute to how competitive the fleet was. Race winners were Desjardins with 4, McKinney & Pepin with 3 each, Scott with two, and Peltier & Lancaster with one each.

Given the adversity faced by all competitors the championship was well earned with the proud winner being WMYC Commodore Terry Desjardins, who epitomizes the grit and determination that was required on this day.

Steveston, BC's Ships to Shore Festival Hosts DF65s

Occasionally, an observer would ask a question about such things as a penalty turn and we knew we had a live one. Kids in particular were often ready to take a radio and give it a try with the owner coaching at their side. Even the media dropped by and a photo of our own Wilson Chong appeared in the Richmond newspaper the following week. While all this distraction did little for the professionalism of our racing that day, it did hit the nail on the head in terms of our outreach goals.

Whether we added any individuals to the hobby may never be known but for sure we did some worthwhile education and promotion. We entertained a boating-oriented crowd and had a great time doing

it, all at a cost of \$0. On a more selfish level, we also demonstrated to influential authorities, including harbor managers and local politicians, that RC sailing is a valid use of public waterways and facilities and one that should be supported. We expect to be invited back next year.

Dragon Force Re-fresh and SOCH Sails Decal Set Review

If you are familiar with the Beatles Sgt.

Peppers album there is a great line in the song Fixing

a Hole that goes "I am taking the time for a number of things that weren't important yesterday".



So it's Thursday evening July 28th, and I am going to be leaving for the cottage straight from work on the Friday. Friday is also the fiscal year end of my business so we have inventory and a staff BBQ - the sales people are working into Thursday night trying to close up deals before year end so my cell phone is buzzing and blinking and late in

Many of us at Metro Marine have been using



the <u>Soch Tuning guide</u> for the Dragon Force with great success. Soch also sells rig kits and a hull sticker sets for the Dragon force that allow you to customize your stock DF for very little time or money.



I had ordered a full length sticker set a few months back for my #14 DF65 which is a generation 1 boat. I had built this boat in 2014 using the aftermarket primed hull which I painted blue Brilliant Blue and raced it for the season with Carr sails. As can happen, in season two my blue #14 boat seemed to get left behind. First the mast split as the early generation 1 boats did not have the metal collars at the appropriate stress points. Then some parts got stripped off for another sailor in need then the wooden radio board turned to mush because I do not properly seal it, and finally I built another DF which

worked like a charm right out of the gate.

I have boxes in the basement for each boat where all the various bits and pieces go pertaining to that projectso it was all right there - sticker set, replacement parts and the forgotten boat all in one place. So at 5 am on Friday morning I loaded a few of these projects that "were not important yesterday" into a laundry basket, packed my tool box and threw in some paints and felt excited at the prospect of finally getting these projects moved past the thinking about stage!

Truth be known - I had actually started the refresh on DF 14 a few months back but it was only a mini project. The mark I DF boats used a double deck wooden radio tray which I mistakenly did not seal up or paint, so it did not take long for this to turn to mush from repeated exposure to the elements. Fellow Metro Marine sailor Glen Barrett suggested sealing the replacement tray with thin CA and then sanding and painting. The result is not only strong and waterproof but you would be hard pressed to identify the tray as being made from wood - almost everyone who sees and owns a MK 1 boat themselves asks where I got the plastic tray.

Before I could apply my Soch decal set i wanted to do a quick re-spray of the hull and keel to touch up all the scraps and scratches it had acquired. I stripped the boat of all hardware plus radio tray and gave it a light sanding and a wash before a quick coat of Tamiya TS 44 Brilliant Blue. The keel was sanded and hung from a branch so it could be painted from all sides in one go. I love the Tamiya TS spray paints and use them whenever I can on my boats to achieve a finish that looks like it took much more time than it





actually did. The grey primer is also a favourite and seems to appear on all my keels and rudders recently, It goes down so smooth and looks so perfect why would you want to paint over it? (My Soling is just this primer with some pin striping) These Tamiya spray paints are available in most hobby stores, but be sure the number on top of the can starts with a TS as many of the same colours are also sold as a PS paint which is for use on clear polycarbonate body shells for RC cars and trucks - not what you want. A few tips on using this paint it is thin, I mean really thin, so best to lay down a primer to avoid excessive coats (especially when using pure white) . One base coat if you prime and one gloss coat are all that is needed and you can polish the paint up after it has hardened for at least 4 or 5 days. Practice spraying this paint as it is so thin, carefully application is required to avoid drips. With the hull and keel with fresh paint it was time to install the new Soch Decals set.

Soch makes a number of different sticker sets to enhance the look of the Dragon Force hull in both full length and half length options in any one of 22 colours. These can dramatically change the look of your DF - especially if you have chosen to keep the stock black hull. Please visit www.sochsails.co.uk for the complete selection of sticker sets.

I ordered a full length sticker set in white with country designation and sail number on both sides of the hull and on the top deck. The website was excellent and (Continued from page 20)

sent me updates as to when the sticker set shipped. It took about two weeks to arrive at my door from the time of order placement. The sticker set is a vinyl product that is laser cut and has some very thin cut outs to go around the hatch opening on the starboard side of the boat. The instructions for application are available as a downloadable pdf on the Soch

website and I warn that these are non-negotiable and must be followed for a successful application. I have had lots of experience applying stickers to R/C car bodies and the described Soch method is tried and true for moving larger stickers around and getting them placed around corners. Start by getting yourself a large bowl of water and dribble in a generous amount of dish soap, swish this around and lather generously over the side of the hull. Make sure to dry your hands and have some paper towels or an absorbent cloth at hand before applying the sticker. Peel off the one of the side decals and move this on to the side of the hull - making sure you still have plenty of liquid on the hull. The dish soap and water will allow you to move the sticker around and get the placement just right. With a cloth or paper towels,



start pushing out water bubbles and liquid to the outside edges. This can take a few sessions every 15 minutes or so as the sticker begins to set - don't worrying about some of the edges not sticking down immediately - as long as you head back and check and re check over the next few hours - these will eventually sit down flat. The top deck sticker was a two person job with my father holding the hull while I

started the application from the bow of the boat. The top sticker has round cut outs for all the deck eyes and these require some careful alignment as you work your way down the hull. The results were dramatic and I love the look of the boat now. Please be sure to fight the "man urge" to ignore instructions and just peel the stickers off and apply them dry - I fear you will end up with either the embarrassing situation of half a set of stickers on your boat, or be back on the Soch website within the hour ordering up a replacement set! It took a full 12 hours for the sticker set to dry and harden up to a nice smooth finish. I cannot recommend this product enough, both in quality and value.

Hope to see you at the DF65 Nationals in October.

Technical Report

By John Ball —Technical Director

The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly! - Three reasons why we need sail numbers

The Good -You want the Race Committee to identify your boat as it crosses the finish line.

The Bad -The Race Committee needs to identify your boat if you are over the start line too soon.

The Ugly -You need to identify your boat and the other boat if you are involved in an incident and need to Protest.

If you want to race, you need numbers on your sails to allow the Race Committee and other competitors to be able to identify your boat. Every recognized CRYA class has a set of class rules that include details on how to place the number the sails, so there is no excuse for getting it wrong - just read your class rules before adding the numbers. To find your class rules, go to www.crya.ca home page. Find the CLASSES tab on the left panel, and click on your Class.

While you should place the sail numbers as directed by your class rules, you will not be wrong if you choose instead to place the numbers as specified in the Racing Rules of Sailing (The RRS), Appendix E.8.

Whichever class your boat fits, there are several common elements -

- 1. Register your boat with the CRYA and you will be assigned a Hull Registration Number (HRN). This number (or at least the last two digits of that number) becomes your Sail Number.
- -The exception to this is where you have requested and been assigned a CRYA Personal Sail Number (PSN), to use on all your boats.
- If your boat comes with a Manufacturer's serial number, this is not intended to be your sail number; it is just for product tracking and warranty purposes.
- 2. The numbers should be displayed on both sides of both the main and jib sails
- 3. The starboard side numbers are ALWAYS placed above the port side numbers.
- 4. The number placement, minimum size, character thickness and character spacing is shown in your class rules
- 5. The numbers have to be in a clear font and of a good contrasting colour
- 6. Don't forget to put the Class Logo on the sail.
- 7. Putting the country code CAN (for Canada) is optional, except at a designated World or Continental Championship, but is a nice touch to show pride in representing Canada at cross-border regattas.

The most common problems that I have seen include numbers that are too small, too skinny, or of a fancy font that make them hard to read, and numbers that are too low on the main sail, and port side higher than starboard.

When you register your boat and receive your HRN, put the number on the inside of the hull as a permanent record - the number stays with the hull, even if you sell it later. (Hint - I print my HRN onto paper in a heavy bold font, cut it out, and 'paint' the paper into the hull with a thin coat of epoxy).

If you have a PSN and sell your boat, the PSN stays with you - the new owner needs to remove the old sail number and replace it with the numbers of the HRN or their own assigned PSN.


