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President's Report

I would like start this report with a thank you to the members who sent me personal emails over the past few months. I hope I managed to acknowledge all of them, but if I did not then please accept both my thanks and apologies.

Elsewhere in this issue is the report by Martin Herbert on the vote counts for the two motions circulated to members. Motion 1 was approved and the re-drafted constitution and by-laws are now in effect. Contrary to rumours being circulate the executive / board was not against supporting events of any type what it had difficulty in accepting was the wording of motion - see the redrafted by-laws.

One of the reasons for re-drafting the constitution and by-laws, apart from making it simpler in the future to modify them, was to meet requirements of the coming new BC Societies act.

Personal Sail Numbers

Members who have been issued Personal Sail Numbers should go to the web site and refresh their memory of PSN conditions. They are reminded that Personal Sail Numbers are "leased" for five years for an **annual** fee of \$5. This is payable with dues at membership renewal time.

Many of PSN holders seem to not be aware of this condition. If not renewed then the PSN should be removed from sails and replaced with the last two digits of the boat's hull registration number. OR pay the annual fee.

Insurance

This is a review of insurance details previously in Canadian Radio Yachting.

The insurance is for members of the CRYA participating in normal sailing activity. The basic insurance is third party liability \$2,000,000. There is some other insurance coverage- loss of data etc. Certificates of Insurance can be issued to a member or club/group to hold as proof when required. We prefer not to have 200 certificates issued

While it does not cover Clubs directly certificates can be issued, as above, to include cover for the pond /lake owner for either the duration of an event or for regular sailing by a group or club.

It does not cover non - CRYA members sailing as part of a club, nor does it cover pure power craft. However members of other National Authorities can be covered when participating in a sanctioned event by the Regatta Chair providing a list of such entrants prior to the event. I may be contacted via my email



address with regard to this.

The "Surplus"

I have been asked several times about our bank balance. How did we accumulate it being the most common question? It should first be understood that over 75% of our so called surplus existed before most of our current members became members. Until 2012 everything we had in the way of dollars was kept in a chequing account and generated about a \$1.20 in interest. The funds are now held in either term deposits or short term investment certificates. When these mature the interest is placed in our chequing account and the term deposit or investment certificate renewed.

When our chequing account holds \$1,000 with no foreseeable demand on it a short term redeemable investment certificate is bought.

The real answer to the question is that the CRYA is a volunteer run organization

The second question is what are we (or you) intending to do with it? As we do not apply for grants etc. no one is going to ask what our intentions are, nor is there a regulation which says how large a surplus we may have. Personally I think they should be used for the benefit of the Association and not buy another beer for a few individuals. As one of the guys in the swamp fighting the alligators, I am waiting for suggestions from those of you on the raft for directions. I would love to have serious proposals towards increasing our membership and reducing the average age of our membership.

I have several "what it involves" out at present. One has answered definitely "Maybe next year," from the others I still await answers.

This association needs a Secretary and a Regional Director for Ontario. It would also be a benefit if we had a Treasurer. I happen to think that the Regional Director for Ontario is perhaps the most important and needs the most effort. My black humour gets a real work out when I hear it suggested from Ontario that Regional Directors should be elected! The answer has to come from the membership and not the president.

Looking for RC Sailing Action Photos

As you go about your sailing events & activities, please keep the CRYA newsletter in mind. I need action photos of your boats, preferably some close-ups or zoomed in shots for the cover of the newsletter.

When submitting photos, please include a brief description of the boat's owner and the event at which the photo was taken.

RRR - Regatta Relay Racing

I've had this idea swirling around in my head for some time now. I recently posted it on the MMM Yahoo chat forum when a request for ideas for fun races was posted.

Similar to swimming relay competitions, my suggestion is for a boat relay race, either made up of all the same class boats, or different class boats.

In the first case, let's say you have completed your class racing for the day and have additional time left over with 9 sailors still wanting to race. Based on the race results for the day, you form 3 teams of 3 boats each. Team 1 = 1st, 6th & 8th place finishers, team 2 = 2nd, 5th & 9th place finishers and team 3 = 3rd, 4th & 7th place finishers. Any boat from each team can start the race and completes one lap of the course. As each boat crosses the finish line, the next boat from each team starts and completes a lap. The race is completed after all 3 boats from each team have completed one lap.



This same concept can be used for multiple classes in one race. As an example, you have 6 Solings, 6 DF65s & 6 Victorias. You create 6 teams with one of each boat class in each team. The first lap can be started with any boat class. All 3 classes in each team must complete one lap of the race.

I suspect this could make for some exciting racing as the difference in boat speed between classes can be made up or lost when you have different classes racing against each other in the same lap.

New AMYA Class - Dragon Flite 95

In March a bigger brother to the Dragon Force 65 was released in North America, UK and Australia. It was designed by the same "Gang of 3" and manufacturer Joysway as the DF65.

The DF95 is 950mm long and unlike the DF65, does not fit into any existing Internationally sanctioned classes. However, due to it's rapid sales growth and popularity in the US, a COA was formed and it has already achieved AMYA sanctioned class status.

I have purchased one for myself and can tell you it is a much different boat than the DF65. It is half the weight of an IOM, but tracks upwind like it is on rails, and is a real screamer downwind.

I look forward to seeing this develop into a CRYA sanctioned class when there are enough boats in Canada & one region to hold races and a regatta.

COW Regatta Report

The Cow Cup stands for Canada, Oregon, Washington and has been a major event for at least seven years since Lawrie Neish helped organize the first one. Canadians supplied most of the boats that year as we introduced the IOM into the region. Now they have massive fleets and almost all new hot boats from Europe and the southern hemisphere, Brazil, New Zealand and Australia. This year the C in Cow



could easily have been replaced with California as 5 of the top 6 places went to that State. Only three Canadians went, Peter Stevens from North Saanich and myself sailing and Barry Fox of Victoria as the Head of Race Committee.

The first day we had good winds with shifts through

about 30 degrees that kept you on your toes. I had good speed and got to play some with the big guns. It was a ranking event for the Americans trying to get a spot at the World Championship in France so boats came from as far away as Florida and the competition was stiff. Every mistake cost you at least one place, sometimes many, so there were lots of opportunities to see exactly where you were standing on the skill level. It was the most fun I have had racing in quite a



while. My goal on the trip down was to try to be in the top third of the fleet so at the end of the day I was pleased to be in 6th place only three points out of the three way tie for third ahead of me.

The second day started with a more steady and slightly lesser wind from the same direction and in the pre race tuning matches I was fast and feeling good. Then the wind switched 180 degrees and a rain storm came in. The wind was up and down and much less consistent, dropping leaders in holes, then knocking them flat. It was less than ideal but I was very open to receiving all the lucky breaks that came my way and the gusts saved my bacon more than once. The rain however got me in the 11th race and my radio packed it in. I had to sit out race 12 and take a last place but over lunch break, Joe D'amico, another competitor, set me up with his spare radio and receiver, switching the direction of his controls to suit mine and finding me connectors to get me going for the 13th race. That is the kind of fleet it was, friendly, helpful and a real example of true sportsmanship. I love sailing with those guys. In the next race Joe's radio died but he insisted that I keep sailing for the last race which let me hang on for 9th overall, just making my goal of the top 1/3, and finishing top Canadian.

The Windsor Model Yacht club began in 1994 by a small group of fellows who also sailed competitively on the "big boats". The model fleets included Solings and US1 meter boats. Today there are about 18 members sailing 5 class fleets including Solings, US1, Footy, RG65, and EC12's.

But something else is expanding in the club. Every third Wednesday, a small group of 8 of these same members bring their radio controlled electric powered tug boats, fishing boats, fireboats and freighters to the pond on what we now call our "windling" days. These models boats run anywhere from 12" up to 72" and are powered with the latest available batteries, running gear, fire hoses, and lighting and sound systems.

There's no marks to round, no countdown clocks to fret about, no strategies to plan, no rules to follow, no penalty turns to make...just good clean "bigboy" toys to play with.

Now some of these model boats are not for the faint of heart when it comes to building (and paying) for them. Some take as little as a couple of weeks; others have taken many years to build. Some are built from detailed plans with laser cut parts; others are

One of these "master builders" has amassed upwards of 3 dozen model boats in his collection. Another has close to 10. Most have 1 or 2 to pick from for our windling days. But the rewarding part about





these windling days is the number of walkers, joggers, and cyclists who stop to admire the fleet. Many ask questions about how they run, how they are built, how much they cost...and occasionally we'll even offer up the radio to the interested persons who are obviously smitten with this hobby, to try it on for size.

By the way, with these boats, you don't have to be concerned with which way the wind is blowing. There's no concern with "getting in irons" or hitting a mark. Like I said...just good clean "big-boy toys".



Technical Report

By John Ball —Technical Director

Problems at the downwind mark - when things go wrong!


It can be hard enough to apply the rules when all is going well, but what happens when someone makes a mistake? Here is a situation that can happen in RC sailing due to the challenge of depth perception. A boat (Yellow) is clear ahead at the zone of a downwind mark to be rounded to port. The skipper misjudges the distance and turns short of the mark. So the skipper hardens up on port, tacks over to starboard and returns to round the mark properly. While she is returning to the mark, another boat (Blue) enters the zone. So the question is "Which rules apply? And which boat gets mark room?"

When a boat is clear ahead entering the zone, she is entitled to Mark Room under R 18.2.b, but R 18.2.b leads to R 18.2.c which ends with the following "However".


However, if the boat entitled to *mark-room* passes head to wind or leaves the *zone*, rule 18.2(b) ceases to apply.

So I have shown two cases, one where the boat passes head to wind in the zone, and the other where the boat leaves the zone to cover both variations.

Case 1, Yellow turns and tacks inside the zone. This is the more likely scenario as the four boat length zone should give enough room for the boat to turn around without leaving the zone. The issue here is that when Yellow tack, she loses the mark room originally granted by R 18.2.b. So now we have to figure out (quickly) which rule(s) apply.



Case 2, Yellow leaves the zone completely while turning back so again her original R 18.2.b mark room ends. In case 2 - Blue arrives at the zone at P4, before Yellow gets back to the zone. So again we have to figure out which rule(s) to apply.



So what do you think for each of these cases? Reading RRS R 18.2 and R 18.3 will be a big help.

In Case 1, Yellow tacks in the zone between P3 and P4. Yellow was entitled to Mark Room under R 18.2.b but when she tacks, her Mark Room under R 18.2.b is cancelled by the 'However' at the end of R 18.2.c.

When a boat tacks in the zone, normally, we would look at R 18.3. Usually we would be talking about a weather mark, and after the tack, both boats would be on the same tack and trying to lay the mark. However in this discussion, and even though one boat tacked in the zone, R 18.3 does not apply here because they are on opposite tacks (gybes) after the tack. If R 18.3 doesn't apply, then we have to look elsewhere for the answer.

In Case 1, the solution lies in the seldom used R 18.2.a which says essentially that when two boats are in the zone, the outside boat will give mark room to the inside boat UNLESS R 18.2.b applies - and in most situations, R 18.2.b does apply. But if R 18.2.b does not apply, or ceases to apply, and R 18.3 does not apply, then we can go back to R 18.2.a. When 18.2.b gets turned off by Yellow's tack, and as both boats are in the zone, now we have the conditions described in R 18.2.a. So the outside boat (Blue) gives Mark Room to the inside boat (Yellow). Note that R 18.2.e places a condition that the outside boat only gives room if she is able e.g. if there are no additional 'outside' overlapping boats in the way and preventing her from giving room.

In Case 2. Yellow leaves the zone after P3. Blue touches the zone at P4 and before Yellow reenters. This case looks harder than it is - Look at Blue and Yellow at P4 and ignore all the earlier movement. What we have is two boats and one of them (Blue) has just reached the zone. Now ask "Are these boats overlapped"? The answer is Yes, as Yellow is ahead of a line drawn square off Blue's transom. So we have two boats entering the zone overlapped and that is a normal R 18.2.b situation - just the angle is unusual. So Yellow is inside boat, and is entitled to mark room and Blue must give that room. At P5 the overlap is broken but that is covered by R 18.2.c and so Yellow still maintains her Mark Room.

In both cases, and after her tack, Yellow comes back towards the mark on Starboard, and Blue is shown on Port, and must keep clear under R 10 P/S. If the diagram had shown Blue on starboard gybe, then she would still have to keep clear of Yellow as she would then have been windward boat under R 11 W/L.

If you did not get this one right off, don't feel too bad - situations involving R 18.2.a are rare and you have to eliminate R 18.2.b and R 18.3 first, and that can be hard to think through in the heat of the moment while avoiding other boats and trying to round the mark without hitting anything.
